


Reims



The cathedral Notre-Dame de Reims was the traditional site of the coronation of the kings of France. The attached Palais du Tau was the home of the Archbishop of Reims

Champagne

Vineyards & Caves



The wine-making region surrounding Reims is best known for the production of champagne, the famous sparkling white wine. The laws of most countries reserve the term exclusively for wines that come from this area. The champagne is aged underground in chalky caves.

Fort de la Pompelle



Fort de la Pompelle is one of a number of forts built around Reims in the 1880s after the Franco-Prussian war. The forts saw combat during the First World War in the defense of Reims.

Verdun



Verdun and its fort are well known for giving their name to the longest battle of the First World War (Feb - Dec 1916).

Nancy

Baccarat




The small town of Baccarat is home to the company by the same name, the well-known manufacturers of luxury crystal glass chandeliers, glassware, perfumes, and home decor

Strasbourg



The largest city in the Grand Est region, Strasbourg is chiefly known for its sandstone Gothic Cathedral with its famous astronomical clock, and for its medieval cityscape of black and white timber-framed buildings. It's also referred to as the "Capitale de Noël" with its famous Christmas market that dates back to the 1500s.

Alsatian Villages



Ribeauvillé, Riquevir, Obernai, and Colmar are typical Alsatian villages known for their timber-framed houses, colorful facades, cobblestone streets, and setting amidst Riesling vineyards
